Radio Frequency Update:

On each action plan, Sgt. Harris makes the following note regarding our portable radio frequency:

All Auxiliary Officers assigned to the event will utilize WC LAW – CHANNEL 11 – OPDTAC1 Note: In the event that ISB is using OPDTAC1, OAP will utilize LOCAL INTEROPS – CHANNEL 3 – WISPEVT3

Unfortunately, we've had several occasions where ISB/DTF has been conducting operations without our knowledge. As part of their operation, ISB/DTF officers use the WC LAW – CHANNEL 11 – OPDTAC1 frequency for communications between their team members. The result could be a situation where our APO's while conducting normal radio traffic, interfere with the communications of the DTF during their special operations.

In an effort to avoid any future frequency issues the follow procedure has been put in place:

- 1) All OAP details are listed on an OPD master event schedule which is able to be accessed and viewed by all OPD staff, and should be referenced prior to any special OPD Team detail.
- 2) Prior to beginning a detail, ISB/DTF will access the WC LAW CHANNEL 11 OPDTAC1 frequency and make the following statement: "Is OPDTAC1 being used by anyone at this time?" They will broadcast this statement twice.
- 3) If they receive no reply, they will begin using that channel.
- 4) If OAP is working a detail and hears that broadcast, the OAP OIC should reply that OAP is working an event and will change to the alternate channel.
- 5) The OAP OIC will immediately instruct all OAP Officers at the event to switch to the alternate LOCAL INTEROPS CHANNEL 3 WISPEVT3 channel for the remainder of the detail.
- 6) Upon completion of the detail, during the process of returning the radio to the equipment storage room, OAP Officers will insure the radio is returned to the normal WC LAW CHANNEL 11 OPDTAC1 channel.

A review on the radio channel changing process will be conducted by members of our Training Squad at the October meeting. You will be instructed on the proper way to change the radios from our standard channel to the alternate channel.

Semi's and Heavy Trucks - all on one mission.

They gathered at the Richfield Pioneer Travel Plaza Saturday morning.

Their plan is to form the largest truck convoy ever seen.

Escorted by law enforcement, each truck marked with an orange ribbon will travel 53-miles from Richfield to Oshkosh.

Organizers say 165 trucks took part, and the event raised more that \$121,000 - the most they have ever raised.

For the past six years, Wisconsin has been the top fundraising convoy.

Wisconsin alone raised almost \$92,000 last year and nearly \$699,000 since 2005.

The exchange of duties should continue to enhance the delivery of public safety service and foster the personal growth and development of both the Captains.

The change is effective immediately with the transition occurring between now and the end of the year, with the full transition completed by December 31st.

Administrative Services Bureau



The Administrative Services Bureau is headed by the **Captain Kelly Kent**, whose responsibilities include the hiring of all sworn officers and civilian personnel, departmental promotions, special assignments, personnel complaints/internal investigations, budget development/management reports, and staff supervision/evaluation. This Bureau is also comprised of the Professional Standards Division as well as the Records Division.

Investigative Services Bureau



The Investigative Services Bureau is headed by **Captain Cyndi Thaldorf**. ISB personnel focus on the investigation of major crimes, ongoing drug activity, and juvenile delinquency in the schools.

This Bureau is comprised of ranking staff, investigative staff Detectives, Police School Liaison Officers, and a Metropolitan Enforcement Group (MEG) Drug Unit Investigator. The ISB is supported by a Crime Analyst, evidence clerks and a secretary.

Sgt. Harris was made aware of a Fire Drill to occur Monday September 29th at Franklin School. The drill required students to walk from Franklin to Tipler School and then back again when the drill was completed. Approximately 400 students would be affected and required to cross several streets in route to and from Tipler.

Detail Reminder:

Just a reminder of your obligation when you sign-up for a detail.

When you volunteer to work a detail, plans are put in-place based on those who are scheduled to work. Sgt. Harris creates his Action Plan based on the number of Auxiliary Officers scheduled. Assignments are developed and operational plans made.

We understand that we often request you to sign up for details several weeks prior to that specific event...things happen, work schedules change.

It has always been the policy of the Oshkosh Auxiliary Police to require any Auxiliary Officer who has signed up to work a detail, but prior to the detail finds they are no longer able to work, must make a significant effort to find a replacement. A significant effort is not just posting a mass e-mail, or contacting me or a ranking officer to advise us. The expectation is that you send e-mails, make phone calls and truly put in a reasonable effort to find a replacement to work your detail. Again, we understand not everyone will be successful, but you must try.

Thank you for your help keeping our details staffed properly.
