As the summer season begins, I want to offer my sincere thanks for everyone's hard work this year and hope all of you will find time to spend with family and friends enjoying the warm weather. There is much to report from the Administrative Bureau since the last newsletter with staff turnover, selection processes, and work initiatives.

In January, Assistant Chief Kurt Schoeni retired after 30 years of service and Sergeant Jeff Nelson retired in March after 24 years of service from the Oshkosh Police Department and 5 years of service with the Kenosha Police Department. Finally, Officer Rachel Van Horn retired in May after 24 years of service and School Resource Officer Tracey Grubofski retired in June after 23 years of service. We thank them for their service and we wish them well in their future endeavors.

In February, there were a couple of changes to the Operations Bureau! On February 19, Officer Brenden Bonnett was promoted to the rank of Sergeant, assigned to 2nd Shift, and School Resource Officer Heather Brickham was promoted to the rank of Detective.

In March, we hired Kaylee Raabe as a Police Cadet and she began the Recruit Academy training at FVTC in Appleton. In June, we hired Aaron Petkovsek and Alexys Schneider as Police Cadets (both former CSO's for OPD) and they began the Recruit Academy training at FVTC in Appleton.

In May, we had four Cadets graduate from the FVTC Academy and start their Field Training Program as Officers. We welcome Officers Garrett Dahms, Olivia Riley, Jeffrey Pennings and Zachary Radde! Also in May, we hired two graduates from the NWTC Academy in Green Bay and they start the Field Training Program in May as well. We welcome Officers Elizabeth Lozano and Justin Krull.





We wish all of our new hires well and expect big things from them in the future! We are actively working to fill additional vacancies for Police Officer and CSOs. I will have more to report on those positions in the next newsletter.

In the first half of the year, we ran several selection processes for various special teams and assignments. This began in January with the completion of a Field Training Officer process leading to the additions of Officers Mike Hendrickson, Jacob Schwartz and Jack Rew to the Field Training Officer position. There was a School Resource Officer process also in January that led to the addition of Officer Angel Nunez — Officer Nunez was assigned to Oshkosh West High School. Officers Rasmussen, Vandenberg and Rennie are all on the eligibility list through January 2, 2025. There was a K-9 process in January that led to Officer Jacob Schwartz obtaining the Handler position and he attended K-9 training along with Officer Roberto Martinez (who was appointed to K-9 handler in 2023) in Pennsylvania in March.

In the beginning of January, there was a SWOT Analysis (Strengths/Weaknesses/Opportunities/ Threats) of the Field Training Officer Program by a committee made up of FTOs and the FTO Supervisors. Chief Smith met with this committee and three areas were identified to address the SWOT Analysis:

- 1) Revision of Training Manual
- 2) Technology & Equipment Needs
- 3) Training/Incentives

The committee members broke into three groups that were each led by the FTO Supervisor for each shift. Chief Smith gave a deadline for the analysis to be completed by June 1, 2024. On May 21, 2024, committee members gave Chief Smith a demonstration of the new PowerReady software and revamped FTO Program that the FTOs and their officers will be using. This is the first change to the FTO Program in over 30 years!!! A lot of hard work and dedication went into this change so that the FTO Program could be better used for both the FTO and their officers in training. Great work to all those involved with this process!!

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS DIVISION

The Oshkosh Police Department is currently in year three (of a 4-year cycle) for CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies). We completed the web-based assessment in December 2023 and are currently about 70% complete with providing documented proofs in preparation for our web-based assessment in December. Our on-site assessment is scheduled for August 2025.

We are currently in year three (of a 4-year cycle) for WILEAG (Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group), with the next on-site assessment scheduled for Spring 2026. The assessments are a continuing process and the department continues to work toward receiving full accreditation from both CALEA and WILEAG.







OPD Annual Full-Scale Exercise

On March 12, 2024, the Oshkosh Police Department conducted a training of its Incident Command System to include administrative functions, SWAT and crisis negotiations. The police department routinely tests procedures through scenario-based training to assure a high-quality response to emergency situations. The scenario is used to gauge what the department does well and to discover any improvements that can be made. This recent test of our Incident Command System was found to be successful and valuable to those involved. The Oshkosh Police Department would like to thank the Evergreen Retirement Community and staff for their collaboration in conducting this training exercise.

The Operations Bureau is comprised of the Criminal Investigations Division and the Patrol Division. These men and women serve our community selflessly while promoting public safety and enhancing the quality of life in our community through innovative policing and community strategies.

As we approach the start of summer, there have been a few changes to the Oshkosh Police Department Operations Bureau.

- Rebecca Kaiser transferred to become the Captain of the Criminal Investigation Division in January.

Patrol Division

During the first half of 2024, Patrol Officers remained busy with directed traffic and safety plans, addressing overall quality of life issues, and conducting Team Policing activities in the community.

1st Shift

The "Cops and Kids" events took place at numerous kindergartens throughout Oshkosh. Officers engaged in these sessions by reading books in classrooms, distributing literature to children, and addressing their queries about the police profession. Rotational school visits facilitated personal connections and promoted literacy. This initiative significantly enhanced the relationship between officers and young community members, fostering trust and community spirit.

In March, we celebrated the retirement of Officer Rachel Van Horn. Officer Van Horn was hired in March 2000, and served many years with us on First Shift. She was a District 4 officer, and also participated in Bike Patrol. Best wishes to Rachel as she embarks on her next chapter.

Several initiatives were undertaken to improve road safety and reduce traffic violations. The focus was primarily on addressing speeding and ensuring compliance with traffic signals, especially in school zones. Operations involved increased patrols in high-incident areas identified through data analytics, the use of speed monitoring devices.

Looking ahead, we will be getting ready for a busy summer. While you are out and about, please focus on water safety, bicycle safety, and general summer hazards. Additionally, more "Cops and Kids" events will be planned for the next school year, but until then, join us this summer in Menominee Park and South Park as we bring out the Command and Community Outreach Vehicle (CCOV) where you will see officers handing out books and other goodies!



2nd Shift

Another busy six months of personnel moves on 2nd shift. We added Sergeant Brenden Bonnett to our supervisory team, as we said good-bye to Sergeant Brett Robertson. Sergeant Robertson took an assignment with the department's Criminal Investigation Division. Sergeant Bonnett comes to the shift with a high level of experience and training as a firearms instructor and SWAT/Sniper Team member as well as a previous Field Training Officer. We look forward to his leadership on the shift. We have also added Patrol Officers Justin Mitchell and Owen Braatz to the team. Both are in their first year of law enforcement experience and are learning quickly.

In the first six months of the year, we have again focused on the development of officers through outside and inside training opportunities. Officers have completed training and certification in the following disciplines: certified instructor; firearms instructor; Crisis Intervention Techniques; K9 Handler Basic; Basic Intoximeter Testing; FEMA Field Force Operations; Motorcycle Operation Recertification; Investigation of Child Maltreatment; Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement; WLEEDA Conference.

Traffic safety continues to be a point of emphasis on the shift. The afternoon commute sees far too many motorists in a hurry, creating unsafe roadway conditions. Since the beginning of the year, officers have logged over 900 Traffic Safety calls for service during our shift hours of 1 pm to 9 pm. During uncommitted time, officers will generate a "Traffic Safety" call for service in an area known or suspected to be a problem area. The officer will record his/her activities and observations in order to better compile overall data for trend analysis. Traffic safety remains a quality of life issue for many community members, and we are working hard to educate drivers to make our streets and neighborhoods safe for everyone!

PATROL DIVISION

3rd Shift

The first half of 2024 has absolutely flown by.

Officers have been very busy with responding to calls for service and proactive patrols. Many of the officers also have collateral duties or belong to special teams. Officer Cody Rukamp has instructed CHEERS bartender training classes and worked on Alcohol Sales Enforcement details to make sure that our community is responsibly serving its patrons. Officer Caitlyn Tohak and Officer Kayla Johnson took time to participate in the Bigs with Badges program through Big Brothers Big Sisters. This program pairs officers with juveniles in our community to help create positive relationships with Law Enforcement. Officer Austin Wunnicke and Officer Austin Magedanz have worked diligently on the recruitment program to help the department locate the best candidates to become Patrol Officers for our community. Officers conduct these duties in addition to their regular Patrol assignments.

The first half of the year has also been filled with officers attending training to increase their abilities and improve their service to the community. Several officers attended ARIDE training, which is the next level in impaired driving enforcement, to better detect drivers who are impaired not only by alcohol, but also by controlled substances. Two officers attended Sexual Assault investigation training, and four officers attended Crisis Intervention Team (C.I.T.) training to better respond to those in our community who may be experiencing personal crisis. Two supervisors attended and successfully completed Leadership In Police Organizations (LPO) school, which is the second level of leadership training, to better attend to the needs of the officers. The Oshkosh Police Department prides itself on its highly trained workforce.

In this operation, over 50 agencies responded with drones to search a vast area. The use of drones continues to be a vital tool to assist officers in solving crimes, and keeping officers and the community safe!

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

Captain Becky Kaiser

The first part of 2024 has proven to be an active one for the Criminal Investigation Division. After returning from his months long training at the FBI National Academy, Lt. Andy Lecker has done an exceptional job guiding the division with their case assignments and monitoring investigations. Under his supervision, the two Sergeants, seven Detectives, three Vice and Narcotics Investigators, five School Resource Officers and the Crime Analyst have been kept very busy.

Notably, January brought in a rash of thefts and attempted thefts of Kia vehicles. Detective Boerner was assigned roughly a dozen cases here at OPD and worked with surrounding agencies with another dozen more that occurred in their jurisdictions. Ultimately, three primary suspects were developed and the investigation led to their arrests, referring 10 cases to the District Attorney's Office and more to follow pending test results from the crime lab. Detective Boerner credits the successes in these investigations to the excellent sharing of information and communication between Patrol and CID. There was a lot of teamwork involved to include dayshift officers processing vehicles for evidentiary value and night shift being tenacious with surveillance and field stops. Furthermore, Crime Analyst Melody Bragdon and Digital Evidence Technician Betsy Fontaine assisted with social media identification and cell phone processing. Property and Evidence Clerks Kris Jahns and Steve Schauz assisted by processing the vast amount of physical evidence submitted and transmitted to the crime lab. Detective Boerner included his appreciation for the Records Division for their patience in dealing with the high volume of open cases to which he was constantly updating and adding new information. In short, this rash of vehicle damage and theft complaints was solved by teamwork that extended to the entire department, and it was a job well done by all!

- Captain Becky Kaiser transferred from the Administrative Services Bureau to spend her last year in CID where she spent many years during her career.
- Sergeant Jeff Nelson retired after 24+ years with our department. His position as VNU Sergeant was filled by Sergeant Brett Robertson.

- School Resource Officer Tracey Grubofski retired after 23+ years of service, dedicating many years to the children in the Oshkosh Area School District.

In June, Officer Mann conducted Media/Reporter training for new reporters at a news outlet in Green Bay.






National Human Trafficking Awareness Day


